We appreciate everything our supporters have done to help us take care of the huge population of animals in our care at any given time. Attending to their emotional and medical needs never ends.

Our Shared Commitment Continues



The five years I have spent working for the SPCA of North Brevard have given me such a wealth of wonderful experiences that it is hard to pick out the most rewarding ones from my aging memory circuits. I do know this though – I cherish more wonderful events in those five short years than in the 32 spent working for the Postal Service. Not a day goes by that my heart is not warmed by some act of kindness by an employee or volunteer or by an animal's entertaining antics. All the employees and volunteers love animals so much that we never fail to have uplifting stories circulating around the shelter helping to ensure that we do not lose faith when a kitten or puppy doesn't make it through an illness.

Another avenue of inspiration lies with the many supporters who donate funding to help our animals to enjoy better lives. The generosity of these many wonderful people is hard to believe at times. I know that we are blessed to have such supporters willing to help us with our animals on such a consistent basis and I give thanks daily for these great folks.

While we have been growing over the last four years and have managed to really improve our Thrift Store, Clinic, Cat Adoption and Dog Adoption facilities, we realize that our biggest challenge is helping the county and all the other animal rescues achieve no-kill status in our county shelters. In order to do this, we believe that every companion animal should be spayed or neutered and we are working to help with this ambitious goal by assisting individuals and groups with very low or no cost spay/neuters. We have worked with Space Coast Feline Network for many years on getting feral cats fixed. We also provide the special feral cat pricing to any other trappers who will bring in feral cats in traps. We recently applied for a grant for spaying/neutering pit bull/pit

bull mix dogs – we got the grant, matched it with funds from our Clinic "Un-Neutered Fee" fund and are committed to performing these free surgeries on approximately 48 of these dogs (over 30 have already been performed). For those not aware, several years ago we instituted an "Un-Neutered Fee" in our Clinic – if a client's animal is over one year old and not fixed, we will charge a \$5.00 fee to perform veterinary services on the animal. That \$5.00 fee is placed in a fund that is used to help those who need assistance in getting their animals fixed.

We are trying to put in for more of these types of grants to provide better access to very low cost spay/neuter surgeries for people who need assistance. The biggest challenge is convincing all people that it is very important to get their animals fixed. There are some prevailing beliefs that neutering or spaying a cat or dog somehow impacts the animal negatively—nothing could be further from the truth. A short internet search will yield thousands of positive reasons, comments and professional opinions for having these surgeries. Pediatric surgeries, 8 weeks old and a weight of 2 pounds, are very common in shelters and no adverse long term consequences have been recorded for these types of surgeries.

Regardless of the animal's age when the surgery is done, it is imperative that it gets done quickly, especially for cats.

It is a fact that female cats are able to reproduce as young as six months old and, given their penchant for escapism, it is essential that they not be allowed into an environment where they can become impregnated. Though dogs generally receive more attention in the animal rescue networks than cats, it is very clear to me that cats are more at risk than dogs. The euthanasia rate for dogs in our county shelters is around 30% whereas about 60% of cats are euthanized -

that is indicative of how serious the animal over-population problem is in our county and how successful cats are at surviving under the worst of circumstances.

Given our love of animals and our commitment to promote policies that we feel will impact animals in a positive way, the SPCA will continue to assist in getting adoptable animals transferred out of the county shelters when we can provide a safe haven for them until they are adopted. During our last fiscal year, ended Sept. 30, 2011, we transferred 357 cats, kittens, dogs and puppies from Brevard County Animal Shelters to the SPCA, enabling these animals to safely await a loving family to adopt them. We feel deeply committed to our "children" and they are treated with dignity and respect while living with us. Our hope is that every animal in our care will find a lasting, loving forever home to spend their lives in, and we will try our best to ensure that this comes to pass. Last fiscal year, our Adoption Staff managed to find safe homes for 1,049 animals – a new record for the SPCA and an indication of how successful our adoption efforts have been over the past few years. I am very proud of our Adoption Staff and the many wonderful volunteers that help to spread the word about our great pets up for adoption. I want to take this opportunity to thank each and every one of the volunteers, employees and donors who believe in our cause and support our efforts to live up to our Mission Statement – "Protecting and providing a voice for the homeless pets of Brevard County."

Shelter Dogs Benefit from Kong Collection Drive

Shelter dogs face a great deal of stress on a daily basis. The pressure of being in an unfamiliar environment, coupled with feelings of abandonment are enough to make a human depressed and anxious. Can you imagine how that feels for a dog who cannot communicate his thoughts to us? A fantastic stress-relieving toy called a Kong has been credited with helping shelter dogs cope with the difficult time they face living in a shelter.

A few Kong chew toys were introduced to the dogs in our kennels and we saw the improvement in dogs' stress levels almost immediately. So, a Kong collection drive was organized and three groups competed to collect the most Kong chew toys for our shelter dogs. We are very grateful to G & S Pet Services, Upper Mohawk, Inc. and to Scenty by Staci Bryant, who won the competition. These three groups collected over \$456 worth of Kong's for our dogs!

A great time was had by all at the Kong Stuffing Party on October 4th, where Kong toys were filled with yummy treats for our shelter dogs and party attendees enjoyed yummy people treats, too! Everyone had such a great time that it was unanimously decided this would not be the last Kong Collection Drive.

The Clinic Corner

The holiday season is upon us. Many of us like to decorate with festive plants, flowers and sparkling fancies creating a wonderful setting to be admired by all. Even your pets will find this décor interesting, though curiosity will encourage them to do more than just sit back and enjoy the view. Here are a few things to be aware of during the holiday season:



Tinsel is very shiny and wisps through the air when batted at. A cat could use this for entertainment all day long. Tinsel, also can be stimulating to chew on for our 4 legged furry family members. This is where danger enters – ingested tinsel can cause serious intestinal obstructions in our pets.

Lights and extension cords can be hazardous if chewed upon. It is best to cover, bury or tack up your electrical wiring for this holiday season to prevent potentially deadly electrical shock.

Poinsettia flower and leaves, while popularly believed to

be poisonous, are not. That said, the sap that comes from its leaves has been found to create skin and mouth irritation and sometimes vomiting, particularly in cats

Mistletoe & Holly berries are extremely poisonous. It is recommended that you remove the berries from the plant before displaying around your house. The berries can cause excessive salivating, vomiting, diarrhea, increased urination, a fast heart rate and even death.

Pine Trees smell fantastic and look spectacular. They are

also very enticing to our feline friends. This can be a huge scratch post or tower to climb. Our canine friends may see these as a chew toy or as the tree in the yard that they hike their leg to urinate on. Nevertheless, any of these situations can be hazardous. The tree could fall, lights could short out and pose as a fire hazard or your pet could ingest these sharp, spiny pine needles that could pierce an internal organ. It is recommended that we keep our curious friends away from these areas using baby gates, sweeping up any fallen pine needles etc.

Joint Effort for Pit Bulls

The SPCA of North Brevard Wellness Clinic has partnered with Community Foundation for Brevard to increase spaying and neutering of pit bulls and pit bull mixes, hopefully reducing unwanted births in that population. Each organization contributed \$2250.00 toward these surgeries and the SPCA promoted the program through our Facebook fans, members and volunteers. This program kicked off October 1, 2011 and, as of November 1, 2011, we have altered 22 of these canines, free of charge. The SPCA Wellness Clinic will continue this program until the funds have been depleted. Merial, manufacturers of Frontline, Certifect and Heartgard, has generously donated a free dose of Heartgard and Frontline for every pit bull and pit bull mix that we alter under this program. Although we have booked all of the surgery spots for this promotion, we are pursuing other grants to continue this and hope to have a similar program for August, 2012. Working together, we can make a difference.

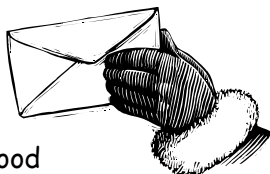

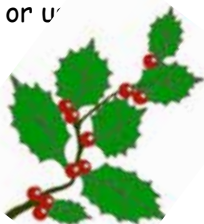
